## GUIDELINES FOR ABSTRACTS

### Purpose of this information

This information is designed to help you prepare an abstract that meets the criteria for BaltPharm Forum conference.

### What is an abstract?

An abstract is a short statement that gives the reader a comprehensive yet concise understanding of your work. Your work could be research, such as a study or clinical trial, or a new or unique service, programme, theory or resource.

An abstract is an opportunity to make your work known, inform practice and/or education, and to establish connections with others in your field of interest. It should tell readers what you are going to present and interest them in learning more about your work — they may decide to attend your presentation, visit your poster or contact you based on it.

### Who is your audience?

Your abstract will have different audiences:

- **Conference delegates** (pharmacists, pharmaceutical scientists, students, educators, policy-makers and researchers) use abstracts to select which sessions to attend.
- **Reviewers** will assess the quality of your abstract and recommend its acceptance (and whether the work should be presented orally or as a poster) or rejection.
- **Journal editors** use abstracts to look for papers to encourage for publication.
- **People who can't attend** the congress access abstracts online.

### Abstract content and structure

Your abstract should contain information under the following **subheadings**:

- **Title.** The title should be short and informative, with a maximum length of two lines.
- **Affiliations.** The name(s) of the author(s) should be written in italic letters, with a font size of 11 pt.; please underline the name of the presenting author. Type the name(s) of the institution(s), including the address for correspondence, city and country, in normal letters with a font size of 9 pt.
- **Introduction.** (Why is your work important? Does it fill any gaps in knowledge or research? What is the context?)
- **Materials and Methods** (Explain your methods, such as study design. What was done, by whom, how and where? What measurements were taken and how were the data managed?)
- **Results and discussion** (What did you find, discover or achieve? Not just in subjective terms, but also in the form of data. How significant were your findings?)
- **Conclusions** (What were your overall findings? What do they mean? How could the methods be improved? Is this work part of a bigger piece of research or strategy? What are the suggestions for future work?)
- **References.** Use a numbered list of references at the end of the article, ordered alphabetically by first author. Please be sure, that you are using Times New Roman font, 10 pt.
- **Acknowledgement (if necessary)**

### IMPORTANT ITEMS TO REMEMBER

- All main text should be single line – spacing, full justification. Please use Times New Roman font, 11 pt.
- The internationally accepted system of units (SI-units) should be used. The chemical nomenclature must be in accordance with the systematic rules adopted by IUPAC or Chemical Abstracts. Trivial names should be avoided unless they have a definite advantage over the corresponding systematic names.
- All abstracts must be submitted in doc- or docx- format. Please note that abstracts sent by pdf will not be accepted.
- **Authors of accepted abstracts does not need printed poster. Presenters will have 2-3 minutes for short presentation in Plenary session (II) on Saturday 13th April, 2019.**

**Deadline for abstract submissions: Friday, March 15th, 2019.**
